ew Beginnings - is the theme at CCA this year. Don't you think "New Beginnings" sounds fresh and exciting, like something is about to happen soon, and you don't want to miss it? The best part of any essay, book or speech is usually the beginning, it grabs our attention, and we instantly decide if we are going to continue reading or listening (like this devotion - ha ha). As I ponder CCA's theme "New Beginnings" I can't help but realize that every new beginning signifies the end of something before it. Let me try to explain. A new day brings the end of the night, a new season brings the end of the last one, sound ends the silence, the Bible says even a seed must die (end) to bring on new life - so I've realized that every new beginning must first begin with an ending - so what does this matter?

Instinctively we recognize that something new has begun and it's a fresh start, a dawn, an idea, a shift, a "Genesis '' or an origin and while often we wish we could tell the future, part of the fun is the wonder of what is to come. We always find out, as the unstoppable seconds of time consistently tick away at the same pace every day until what began at the beginning is evident. The Bible tells us that "He who BEGAN a good work in you, will continue it until the day of Jesus Christ (Phillipians 1:6). The best part about our lives is that we can have as many new beginnings as we want - the Bible is full of people who started over, needed another chance, or completely ended one thing to start something new. We can start new traditions, new friendships, new jobs, a new school, we can start new and healthier habits, or start a spiritual journey - there are countless beginnings and an endless amount of endings as different and as individual as you and me, but one thing is sure - each beginning begins with something ending.

As we focus on "New Beginnings" in 2021-22 I challenge myself to examine what is happening in my day today, and in my life right now that is making a place for something new to start? Some of you know that a broken knee has ended my mobility (hopefully temporarily) but has begun a path to recovery and discovering what the family of God means to me in a time of difficulty. What will end for you to make way for something exciting and promising? I can't help but remember that "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, His mercies <u>never come to an end</u>, they are <u>new</u> every morning, great is HIS faithfulness! (Lamentations 3:22-23)

I pray that wherever you are at, if you are at a start or at an end, that you will be blessed with renewed excitement and energy for what lies ahead and be blessed to know that God's love for us never ceases and are NEW every morning.

# Truth and Reconciliation Assembly

On Thursday, September 30<sup>th</sup> CCA commemorated the national Truth and Reconciliation Day by holding an assembly here at CCA. Mrs.May led the assembly because of her soft heart for indigenous peoples.

Mrs. May's family has a strong connection with Manitoulin Island, home to the six Anishinaabe First Nations, with many friends that live there. Her friend Lianne Hovingh works as a nurse on the Wiki reserve, and her husband Marc was an OPP officer who served with grace and truth each day in a very difficult demographic. This past November, Marc was shot and killed on duty, leaving behind her friend Lianne and their four children. It will be one year on November 19.

However, Mrs. May has seen through her friend Lianne how the native people of Manitoulin Island have surrounded her family since Marc's death. The First Nations have worked hand in hand with the OPP, Lianne's church and the families of Manitoulin Island in ways that only God could orchestrate. He is moving in a powerful way by uniting the indigenous people with the white peoples on the Island, and it truly looks like God will demonstrate what Holy love and unity look like through this story.

As the Island grieved the loss of Marc, they were devastated by the findings of the unmarked graves throughout Canada, many of which were their own parents, grandparents, aunts, and uncles. The loss on one Island is incredible. Our hearts are sad for them, and sometimes there are no words. The loss, in general, is devastating, and God calls us to stand in His Truth and offer hope and love to those who are suffering.



How wonderful of an opportunity it is, that at CCA, we get to model what love looks like to our students, the future generation. Our prayer is that God will use us to be a healing balm right where we are, on this traditional land of the Anishinaabe and Mohawk peoples.

# Volunteer Opportunities

Normally family involvement and volunteerism is critical to the health of our school. Volunteerism helps keep tuition down and enables families to take an active role in the spiritual, educational, relational, emotional and physical development of their children. Each family has an obligation to put in <u>25 hours</u> of volunteer work each year (unless you opted out by paying the extra \$500).
